My overall recollection of HLC is one of incredible happiness, peppered with late night dorm chats, sports days, quiet reflection in the chapel services, the mesmerising choir, a wonderfully eclectic set of teachers, and of course all the learning that got me a great set of GCSE results!

I studied Social & Political Sciences at Cambridge University, and then became a strategy consultant at Boston Consulting Group. After that I had a 15+ year corporate career as Managing Director of various digital businesses in the media, retail and financial services sectors.

The Olio journey started when I was moving, and found myself with some good food that we hadn't managed to eat. And so, the idea of Olio, a mobile app where neighbours and local shops and cafes can share surplus food, came about.

I started to research the problem of food waste more broadly with my co-founder Saasha Celestial. Globally one-third of all the food we produce gets thrown away. Alongside this we have 800 million people go to bed hungry every night.

So far over 7 million people have joined Olio, and together they've given away over 100 million portions of food and 9 million household items. This has had an environmental impact equivalent to taking over 430 million car miles off the road, and has saved 16 billion litres of water.

HLC gave me an incredibly well-rounded experience that encompassed both the academic and interpersonal sides of life. And ultimately you need both of those things to succeed!



ALUMNI PROFILES

LOTTIE MCGUINNESS

Lottie McGuinness was at Highfield and HLC from 2009 to 2018. She was in Nightingale, and was a Member of the Charity Committee. She is a GB Para Powerlifter, and also works part-time for the NHS at a General Practice.



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My fondest memories of HLC were the Christmas events and celebrating with your houses. Being able to sing carols at candlelight ended the winter term in such a lovely way. Sporting events were also a fun time, from house swimming to lacrosse and cheering for my friends in their events.

I went on to study Sports Science at Leeds Trinity University. I recently graduated from University and plan to take time out before studying nursing.

In 2019 I was spotted at the National Dwarf Games for Para Powerlifting and from there I was put on the National Talented Pathway Programme, which led me to compete at international competitions in just 10 months. A year later I was put on the World Class Programme, which I am still currently on, where I hold a top eighth ranking in the World for my weight category.

The Junior World Championship medal will always hold a special place for me as it was my second international medal but my first major event medal. I remember being on the platform with my teammate, and I had my phone in a pocket on record so I could always have on record the first time the national anthem was played when I made the podium.

My goals are to compete at next year's Paralympic Games in Paris, and to retain a top eighth title in the world for my category.

HLC made me become the woman I am today; the motto 'I Am Me' really empowers young women to be themselves and not let anything change that. I know especially when performing – if I am my true self, I will perform well.





SARAH JOHNSON

Sarah was at HLC from 1996 to 2003 and was in Lancaster boarding house. She started life in Oman before coming to the UK aged 11. She is a Human Rights and Global Development Reporter at The Guardian.

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House dramas, sport, music and public speaking activities meant there was always something to get involved in and this was a real plus to the school. The people I met were also a real highlight.

I left school to study French and Spanish at Newcastle University. I then trained to teach English as a foreign language and a teacher helped secure me a position in Vietnam. It was an incredible experience, but I didn't love the teaching role, so I tried freelancing. I started writing for the Vietnam equivalent of Time Out magazine where I quickly rose to Deputy Editor. I also wrote travel guides and did some editing for the English language version of one of the national newspapers. After 2 years in Ho Chi Minh City, I headed back to the UK.

I made the decision to study for an MA in Journalism at City University. On completing my postgraduate degree, I secured some shift work at the Daily Mail where I was working 5pm – 2am from Thursday to Monday every week. I had interviewed for a role at The Guardian.

and was approached to take up a onemonth role to cover for someone at the paper. That was 9 years ago!

I focused on writing about healthcare managers, then expanded the role, reporting on the NHS more broadly. I started highlighting the stories of people who were in desperate situations and I began covering social affairs. I secured funding to spend a month in Brazil and wrote articles about people working in public services who were tackling social injustice in the country. My favourite piece was about a scheme that trained beauticians to recognise the signs of domestic violence.

When that role at The Guardian came to an end, another job came up reporting on human rights and global development.

As part of my role during the pandemic, I shared the stories and anecdotes of healthcare workers to raise awareness of the conditions they were working in, as well as some of the positive moments. I then got a book deal, so things have gone a bit bonkers!"

2023 RECENT LEAVERS CELEBRATION

On Friday 6th January 2023, HLC hosted our first Recent Leavers Celebration for those that had left Upper 6 in either 2020, 2021 or 2022 and their parents - and over 50 people attended.

The special drinks reception enabled guests to dress up in cocktail attire and see fellow former pupils and teachers. It was also an opportunity for us to present prizes to those who left College in 2020 when we were unable to hold our normal Speech Day in person due to the pandemic.

THE OPENING OF SWINTON THEATRE

HLC officially opened its performing arts centre on 13th June 2023 after a major refurbishment project. Staff, pupils, parents and alumni were joined by the Earl and Countess of Swinton for the official opening of the newly named, Swinton Theatre (formerly the Small Hall, and the gymnasium before that).

The name of the newly refurbished performing arts space was chosen by alumni of the school. The name recognises the generosity of the Swinton Estate in providing a temporary home for the school during World War 2 when the school's buildings in Harrogate were requisitioned by the Ministry of Air Production.

The school spent more than 6 years at Swinton Castle between 1939 and 1946 having packed up and moved the entire school, together with 300 pupils, with just 10 days' notice.

Alumni were asked to choose a new name for the theatre after they donated money for the refurbishment project, along with current parents of the school, to which we are incredibly grateful.

As well as full re-decoration, the refurbishment project also included the installation of new sound and lighting technology to enhance the teaching and performances of drama, music and dance that take place in the space.

The school has also recently formed the Harrogate Ladies' College Dance Company to provide additional opportunities for pupils in this field of the performing arts, which takes place in The Swinton Theatre.

HLC has always been delighted to welcome family members across multiple generations, and in some cases, the number of pupils from one family has been substantial. We have highlighted one of these below, and were delighted to receive an update from Alison Moore (née Barber) to find out what happened to her and her family after leaving HLC, or Swinton Estate if they attended during the war years:-

Schools like HLC bring people together from different places and help form special relationships that wouldn't otherwise happen. Madge Grant is a good example, as she met her future husband as a direct result of her time at Harrogate. One of her school friends, Margaret Victoria Barber, lived in Holmbridge, Yorkshire and when she went to stay with her she met her brother, Harold Barber.

After they were married, they went on to have 7 children - 6 girls and a boy - in order: Joyce, twins Gillian and Valerie, Lindsay, Rosemary, Alison and Carol. Five of the sisters went to HLC or Swinton, and the remaining sister attended Oakdale

Margaret Joyce Barber (who went by the name of Joyce) was the eldest of the sisters. She was located at HLC and then moved to Swinton Estate during the Second World War.



Joyce left school in 1943 and went on to do a secretarial course. As soon as she completed her exams she enlisted in the WRNS. She wrote

diaries about her life in the WRNS, and stated that during her initial training at HMS Collingwood, near Fareham "she only survived the gruelling first few weeks due to her time away at school". Joyce was stationed at Haslemere in Surrey and then at Naval HQ in Portsmouth, working mainly as a teleprinter operator. She will have been the first person at Naval HQ to receive the news of the official surrender of the German High Command and the end of the war in Europe, as she transcribed the official message sent out by General Eisenhower.

Joyce was then posted to Australia with the WRNS, before returning to Holmbridge where she married her husband, John Lawton Sandford (known as Jack). They had 3 children, the eldest of whom was Julie, who became the first of a third generation of pupils at Harrogate from this line of families when she started at Harrogate College in the 1960s. Suzanne, Sophie and Rebecca (day pupils) subsequently also attended HLC.

The other 2 sisters who were relocated to Swinton Estate during the war were twins, Gillian and Valerie Barber, who were 18 months younger than Joyce. When they left Swinton Castle towards the end of the war, they went to Agriculture College and got diplomas in Dairy Management. They ran Hill Farm in Holmfirth and had the first pedigree Red Poll herd in the area. They moved to Kirkby Overblow and helped their brother Lindsay with his farm, finally running a shop in Reighton Gap. They were very good riders and hunted well into their 70s and always had a horse or pony for their nieces and nephews to ride.

The fourth sister, Rosemary, started at Oakdale (late 1940s for a couple of years) but due to health issues was then educated near her home at the Grammar school.

Alison and the youngest sister, Carol Barber, went to HLC and were both in Lancaster House (Alison was at HLC 1950 - 1955). Their parents were keen for them to work in a profession, and after school Alison attended Ilkley College of House Craft and then went into teaching (Home Economics) at Garforth near Leeds. She got married in 1960 and moved around a lot with her husband, but always worked as a teacher.

After school Carol attended Leeds General Infirmary and became a physiotherapist. She is a keen gardener, as they all enjoyed a love of gardening from their mother. She currently resides in Somerset. Out of the 7 siblings, they are all now deceased except Alison and Carol.

TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES

Harrogate Ladies' College:

Early Alumni, by historian, Dr. Paul Jennings

In this piece, I look at the lives after school of 2 of the girls in particular who attended the College in its early years. In an address to the assembled girls in 1906 Miss Jones, the headmistress, outlined the school's ethos and what it was trying to achieve for them.

She believed passionately in their right to an education just like their brothers, and for some it would form the path to a career, but she made it clear also that although for most it would make them better people it would make them more particularly better wives and mothers. As she put it, 'The homes of England will be all the happier when presided over by a greater number of thoughtful, intelligent and liberally educated women'. Of my 2 examples, one did indeed become just such a woman and one also did pursue a distinguished career.

Faith Bagenal was the daughter of a senior civil servant in Dublin, and was born in that city in 1889. She was at the College from 1904 to 1908. Her father's work had brought him to Harrogate as an Inspector for the Local Government

Board and the family lived in the town on Kent Road and later Clarence Drive, the latter house, number 17, now owned by the College. From school she went on to Newnham College, Cambridge to study Economics. Several women went to Newnham and the school and college may have formed some connection over these years.





The first photograph shows Faith in her matriculation year, fourth from the right. She wrote a piece for the College Magazine from that first 'Freshers' year. telling how she was involved in the movement for Women's Suffrage and debating other important issues of the day, like reform of the House of Lords. Indeed, she returned to the school to read a paper on suffrage to the Old Girls' reunion, but the motion in its favour was defeated by a majority of 4. But there was also time for fun at Newnham, for example at what she called an 'orgie' in the big hall, a dance from 8.30pm till 10pm, ending with the 'feature of the evening' - the Lancers. This was an allwomen event, as women at the colleges were fairly strictly chaperoned at this time, but it was likely that at Cambridge she met her future husband. Hubert Henderson, who was also an economics student at Emmanuel College, and the pair married in 1915. They were both part of the Bloomsbury Set, which included Virginia Woolf and her sister Vanessa Bell, who painted Faith's portrait.

The second photograph shows her on a picnic from that time with other members of the set: Hubert is to the left, then Faith, then biographer Lytton Strachey, Lady Ottoline Morrell, hostess and patron of the arts, philosopher Bertrand Russell, with whom Morrell had an affair, and mathematician Henry Norton, Hubert, unlike Faith, pursued a distinguished career as an economist, including along with Maynard Keynes as a key advisor to the government on economic planning during the Second World War, for which he was knighted. Apart from publishing a short memoir of Hubert after his death in 1952. Faith did not herself pursue an academic career but was said to be 'inclined to left-wing politics' and, I am pleased to report, led 'a singularly happy family life'. She died in 1979. Their son. Sir Nicholas Henderson, was a diplomat, latterly the British ambassador to the United States. TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES

Taking the path of a career meant almost invariably teaching at this time. Among other girls who went to Cambridge was Ruth Arden, a wine merchant's daughter from Beverley, whose teaching career included Ashville College, Harrogate to 1919, then an all-boys' school, but chiefly at Bedford High School, at which she taught from then to 1941. Vera Edminson, went into teaching and from that to lecturing, eventually becoming Vice-Principal of Bath Domestic Science College in 1948. She was involved in 1964, described as a Book of Comfort. Service to others in some form was the principal career avenue for these women, including for a few in medicine, like Agnes Westwood, born in Cupar, Fife, who studied at the London School moving to hospital work and eventually to general practice in Bromley.

My second main example is May Curwen. She moved from teaching to a distinguished career in administration.

She was born in 1889, the daughter of a timber merchant from Birkenhead, and moved from the High School there to the College. She too went to Newnham College, in 1911, where she gained a degree in History, although I should point out here that women could not actually be awarded the degree at Cambridge until 1948, after dogged resistance over many years by the dons.

May began her career in teaching at a girls' school in Staffordshire but in 1916 she became the secretary to the Scottish Women's the Young Women's Christian Association as education secretary, and was later the National General Secretary from 1930 to 1949. After retirement she pursued a particular interest in refugees, acting as the British delegate to the UN High 1954 to 1958 and was President of the British Council for Aid to in 1973. A career for most women not marrying, as was the case with Dame May, as she became, as she is in the photograph.

GCSE RESULTS

Our pupils celebrated an outstanding set of GCSE results, which saw stellar grades in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) subjects.

Over 75% of all grades across Physics, Biology and Chemistry at the school were the top 9-7 grades. Overall 57% of all grades were 9-7, 36% were 8-9 and 16% were grade 9.

Over 60% of pupils at the school achieved 5 or more top 9-7 grades.

There were strong results across all subject areas, including Languages where 100% of French grades were 9-8; Humanities where 79% of Geography grades were 9-7; and Creative Arts where almost 90% of all Textiles grades were 9-8.

A total of 7 Textiles pupils at the school were also individually congratulated by the Exam Board for being among the highest performers in the country.



A LEVEL RESULTS



We welcome those that left Upper 6 this year to our alumni community. Congratulations to them for achieving impressive A Level results, which saw a significant increase in top grades over the comparable 2019 results. We wish them well as they settle into the next chapter of their lives.

Despite Government warnings to expect grades in line with 2019 results, pupils at the school secured 41% A*-A grades, an increase of more than 17% on 2019 grades. Pupils also achieved twice as many top A* grades this year compared with results in 2019.

Over 50% of the A* grades were achieved in Science, Maths, Engineering and Technology (STEM) subjects with impressive results across all subject areas including Modern Foreign Languages where 75% of all French grades were A*; Humanities where 85% of all Geography grades were grades were A*-B and Creative Arts where 90% of all grades were A*-B. Five subjects, including Further Maths, achieved a clean sweep of 100% A*-B grades.

Overall, 68% of grades were A*-B and 82% were A*-C, both figures showing significant increases on 2019 grades.

UKRAINIAN TWIN SISTERS DEFY WAR TO ACHIEVE TOP A LEVEL RESULTS

You might have seen this incredible story reported in The Times and on the BBC about the significant challenges faced by two of our recent alumni.

Despite the turmoil of war in their home country Ukraine, twin sisters Diana and Sofiia Shypovych achieved A*A*A* and A*A*A respectively in their A levels.

Not knowing what lay ahead for their country, the sisters joined Harrogate Ladies' College in September 2021 to study for their A levels. Leaving their parents behind in Ukraine, they joined the school as boarding pupils. However, just a few months later Ukraine was invaded and they found themselves unable to return home and studying for their A levels amidst ongoing fears for the safety of their family, their friends and the future of their country.

Sofiia, who alongside her sister, ran campaigns in Harrogate to fundraise for Ukrainians and helped Ukrainian families on the Homes for Ukraine scheme settle into the community, said she was delighted with her results.

"I am so grateful to the school for supporting me through the last 2 years. It was difficult being away from my family, but school actively promotes inclusion, diversity and being yourself. That really helped me." Sofiia said.

Diana added: "University will be our next exciting chapter. Despite everything that has been happening in Ukraine, school has given me and my sister the confidence to mature into independent adults through the opportunities, challenges and freedoms it has offered."

Both sisters were voted by their fellow pupils and teachers to be Prefects at the school during their time in Sixth Form.

The sisters chose to return to Ukraine after graduating from the school this summer to be reunited with their family and friends. We are delighted to report they have both gained places at Cambridge University to study Psychology and Behavioural Sciences.





NATIONAL EDUCATION AWARDS

Outstanding New Initiative of the Year Award - Finalist

HLC secured a place in the final of a prestigious national competition thanks to our inspirational programme designed to encourage more girls into Science careers. The school was a finalist in the Independent School of the Year 2023 Awards in the Outstanding New Initiative category.

The school launched WiSE@HLC (Women in Science and Engineering @Harrogate Ladies' College), which is a bespoke programme to encourage pupils to embrace Science opportunities, develop critical thinking in Science and Technology and rewards self-motivation in Science subjects.

Pupils receive WiSE points and rewards for engaging in extra-curricular activities to take their STEM studies further. Sixth-formers are encouraged to become WiSE ambassadors and to work with younger pupils.

The programme also actively engages with former pupils working in STEM related careers and holds special events such as a Crime Scene Investigation (CSI) Day which brings in local forensic experts.

As a result, the number of pupils engaged in STEM related activities, trips and lectures has increased and recent leavers have gone onto study a wealth of Science-related subjects such as Astro Physics, Chemical Engineering, Aeronautical Engineering and even as apprenticeship in Formula One Motor Racing.

Highfield Prep school was also Shortlisted for Prep School of the Year, in the Independent Schools Awards.

BUSINESS LEADER OF THE YEAR AWARD

HLC Principal, Sylvia Brett a Finalist for Business Leader of the Year

Principal, Sylvia Brett was recently recognised as a Finalist in the 'Business Leader of the Year' category in the Harrogate Advertiser Business Excellence Awards.

It is under Sylvia's leadership that our school introduced WiSE@HLC - an area where Sylvia believes women are "shockingly under represented".

Wellbeing is also a passion of Sylvia's and she championed the development of a new Wellness Strategy and the opening of a dedicated Wellness Centre prior to Covid, something she believes really helped the organisation to cope with the challenges that the pandemic threw at staff, pupils, and parents. The Wellness Centre opened in 2018 and was one of the first of its kind in the country for wrap-around physical, spiritual and pastoral care.

The theme of this year's Speech Day, which attracted an audience of over 600 pupils and parents, was Time.

In her address, Principal, Sylvia Brett, who has been leading the school for 10 years reflected on this theme and on the importance of making the most of every moment.

"However long this moment in time may last, it is vital that we not only make the most of it but also realise how quickly it will pass. In this moment we say farewell to our leavers in the comfort that their joy, friendship and creativity will last forever." Sylvia said: "It is so important to mark moments in time and to grow from them optimistically. Our school is 130 years old and as we celebrate this anniversary it drives us on to equip our pupils for at least another 130 years. We can do this because we have such strong roots in our school community.

Our leavers go into the world, marking Speech Day as a moment in time in their lives, ready to change the world for the better. They can do this because of the values which grounded their time here and which I see in them every day."



The event also included a review of the school year by pupils and speeches from the head prefects as well as a performance by the school's Chapel Choir. Dozens of pupils received prizes for their success during the past year in academia, performing arts, creative arts, sports and overall contribution to school life.





NOW IS YOUR TIME TO SHINE PUPILS TOLD IN INSPIRATIONAL SPEECH

A lifetime looking for the good in others is a lifetime well spent was the inspirational message delivered by the first female Lord-Lieutenant of North Yorkshire at this year's Speech Day.

Mrs Johanna Ropner, who took over the Lieutenancy in 2018, urged the packed audience of pupils not only to use the hard skills learnt from their school years and often a pre-requisite to a successful career, but also never forgetting to be kind and gracious to others.

Mrs Ropner told the pupils: "The most important thing is to believe in yourselves, and realise your true potential, never turn down an opportunity.

Follow your passion. We all have the potential to be successful but it's not just accomplishments in the professional world that define us – I have learned as Deputy Lord-Lieutenant. Lord Lieutenant and as a

mother that the softer skills are equally as important."

And she described how she suffered a car accident which left her hospitalised and bed-bound for 4 months. "I was shown so much kindness and good grace over those months. It stayed with me. Never make the mistake that being kind is somehow soft. Look for the good in others. There are exciting new chapters for those of you leaving this great bastion of education. You've been given a wonderful springboard here at Harrogate Ladies' College. Grasp every opportunity, now is your time to shine," she said.





FLOURISH PASTORAL SUPPORT PROGRAMME

'Flourish' is our umbrella term for our pastoral support at school. It is best described as an 'eyes everywhere' approach which has the buy-in of every teacher. Every single contact with every child each week is discussed by the Flourish team, which includes trained care practitioners, heads of years, boarding staff and the school's mental health lead. This detailed approach means the team can anticipate children's needs in a truly proactive way and offer bespoke support – whether that is academic help, counselling sessions, or suggesting a peer buddy with someone of their own age.

We recently launched an innovative Flourish app for pupils so teachers can monitor their wellbeing. It works on a simple scale of working out how their mood is, how they feel about friendships, diet, exercise, their water intake, their sleep patterns, and even their use of electronic devices. The tutors have an oversight of the app and can check on the status of their pupils' feelings on that particular day. It can be used to trigger a conversation with pupils and check if support is needed – that can be in the form of volunteer peer support or specially trained older Wellness Champions.


We are delighted to welcome Mia Edmondson as the second Alumni Prefect. Her role is to educate current pupils to the benefits of them joining our Alumni Association once they have completed their studies at HLC.

Mia will be working closely with the Alumni Relations Officer which will include co-ordinating a Prefects' Takeover Week, where they will provide the content for our alumni social media and e-newsletters across a week in November. This ensures our alumni are kept up-to-date of school news over the Autumn Term, joining up our pupils old and new

Mia is also spending time in the archives, ensuring we have an up-to-date inventory of items across the history of our school.





Throughout the history of HLC we have provided financial support to families who might not otherwise be able to fund school fees. Our well-established means-tested bursary programme reflects this, enabling those with a passion for the school and demonstrable potential to enrich the community of Harrogate Ladies' College.

Over the past decade, our bursary programme has supported many pupils in their education. A bursary is often life changing for the young people it supports and their families. For many of these young people however, funding may not be the only barrier to education. Some are from deprived areas or have experienced an unsettled life at home. They may be incredibly talented and academic but their learning is suffering due to a school environment this doesn't work for them. Or they may just need that extra support offered by us that will unlock their potential and help them flourish.

The school currently provides some level of financial assistance to 57 pupils, including 3 Ukrainian pupils who have relocated to the UK as part of the Homes for Ukraine scheme (a sponsorship scheme that allows people and organisations in the UK to offer Ukrainians fleeing the war a home). We would like to thank the alumni association (HCU) who have kindly donated £1,000 to enable one of these pupils to continue their passion for music.

We're proud of what we have achieved over the years through our bursary programme, but with many families facing financial challenges due to the cost of living crisis, it means we have seen a large increase in bursary applications. That is why we reached out to you for help with the new 1893 Scholarship.

The 1893 Sixth Form Scholarship is funded by the alumni community. It provides financial assistance for a local pupil to attend school in the Sixth Form in order to support them on the final part of their educational journey towards university.

Thanks to the incredible support and generosity of our alumni and friends we have awarded our first 1893 Scholarship this year to an incredibly worthy recipient.

The funding you have provided will transform the future of this pupil and her

family. We simply cannot thank you enough for being part of this.
