CLARENCE AND YORK 1992-1995

Frances is a helicopter air ambulance pilot for Air Evac Lifeteam and lives near her family's farm in Russellville, Indiana, USA. She attended HLC while her family were stationed at Menwith Hill

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Some of my most vivid memories of school are the class trips. We went to a medieval village where we played the roles of different villagers, like making candles and guarding the gate. Those trips made the history lessons come alive!

After graduating from Virginia Tech, I commissioned as an officer in the U.S. Navy. At the Navy flight school in Pensacola, Florida, I learned to fly airplanes and helicopters, the latter becoming my passion. I deployed on destroyers and aircraft carriers around the world. One of my missions was anti-piracy in the Mediterranean Sea, where we worked to prevent ships from transporting illegal weapons between countries.



After 11 years, I finished my service. I spent one summer at the Grand Canyon in Arizona, flying tours. Then I returned to my roots and moved to Indiana to be close to family, where I started flying the air ambulance.

I love flying helicopter air ambulances. With a nurse and medic onboard, I pick up injured people from accidents and fly them to hospitals. We get to help people on their worst days, and I'm amazed by the care our nurses and medics give that keeps critically injured people alive.

I've found the most important thing about my workplace is the people that I work with, and here I get to work with people who care about their community and want to make a difference.

I've also become interested in the medical side and am currently attending an online programme studying applied neuroscience with King's College London.

The rigorous academic work at HLC grew my study skills, diligence and perseverance and they've all helped me get to where I am. The emphasis on service I learnt at school is a value I've carried throughout my career.

ÀJOKÉ BÓDÚNDÉ

FRANKLIN AND TOWER 2014-2016

Àjoké is currently in law school in Nigeria and balances this with a career in the creative arts.

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HLC was an environment where I thrived both academically and through extracurricular activities. Some of my fondest memories include being part of the school's production of Dido & Aeneas, the annual House Music competition, and Sixth Form Review.

I went on to study Law at Durham University. In my final year, I enjoyed Jurisprudence as a module, particularly Feminist Jurisprudence. This was one of the reasons I decided to pursue an MSc in Gender Studies at the London School of Economics. I then completed the Bar Practice Course and was called to the Bar of England and Wales in 2021 (Lincoln's Inn). I hope to get called to the Nigerian Bar in 2025.

I founded The Writers' Room Collective this year. It is an enterprise invested in creating and platforming stories across various mediums, fostering the works of other creators through community building and nurturing the minds of young people, with hopes of expanding their imagination of ways they can take up space in today's world. Submissions for our digital publication will open in 2025!



I also support the incredible work of The Caine Prize for African Writing, an annual literary Prize in its 25th year that has supported the works of emerging African writers and their entry into the world of mainstream publishing.

I am a judge for the Abebi Award in Afro-Nonfiction, a co-editor of Noisy Streetss Magazines' Love in Detty December Edition and a writer. My poetry has appeared in Aké Review (2017), Kalahari Review (2018), The White Review (2023), and Black Joy Unbound: An Anthology (2023). I have also been shortlisted for the Merky New Writers' Prize (2019) (founded by artist Stormzy and Penguin Random House) and The White Review Poet's Prize (2023).

In the future, I want to do what I do now but on a larger scale. I hope to practice law across multiple jurisdictions, and balance this with my work in the creative arts.

Being a boarder in an all-girls school far away from home instils a level of confidence, independence and responsibility in you and have been useful to my life and career. These are all things that were nurtured during my time at HLC. What a gift!

In the early days, a group of younger children was housed in Woodlands as part of the senior school, and in 1916 the Oakdale estate was acquired, and the preparatory department became a separate entity.

This beautiful house, set in 20 acres of ground, was designed as a miniature Haddon Hall. It was situated in Kent Road about half a mile from the senior school. Oakdale was presided over by Miss Jones's sister Lena, afterwards Lady Bell, and around 40 children transferred there. Massive Plane trees edged the drive and the girls had to run the circuit of the building every morning before breakfast unless it was raining!

Oakdale had its own teachers, and pupils were taught in the downstairs classrooms lined with oak panelling and slept upstairs in dormitories. It had its own activities and children were allowed to bring their own pets.

A former pupil commented:

"The environment of the school was absolutely delightful to a small child. The driveway swept from the gate to the steps of the house, and it was possible to ride a horse up to the dining room!"

Lena remained in charge until 1935 when she retired at the same time as her sister. Miss Jacob came as headmistress in 1935. In the 4 years before the outbreak of the war some additions were made to the Oakdale premises. A large extension. consisting of a new gym, music rooms, dining room and bedrooms was built, and numbers went over 80



Oakdale was not commandeered in the war. Miss Jacob visited Harrogate once a week as petrol was granted for essential journeys. During the handful of air-raids that Harrogate experienced, they huddled under blankets under the arches of the Great Hall, considered the safest place, to listen to the story of Pinocchio. Throughout the war years and afterwards, Oakdale was full and flourishing. Miss Todd was appointed Head Mistress at HC in 1952.

The pattern of education in the country was changing, and by the 1960s the increasing cost of upkeep made the financial aspect worrying. In 1968 the governors concluded that Oakdale should be closed, and children were transferred to a house in Clarence Drive. In 1970 it was sold to a businessman, but affairs went wrong for him, and he left the country, leaving it vulnerable to vandals. As a listed building it was referred to the Ministry of the Environment who sadly ruled in favour of demolition due to the state of dilapidation.

TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES

Harrogate Ladies' College: Culture, Sport and Recreation in the early school -By historian, Dr. Paul Jennings

The ladies' college was founded in 1893 as an offshoot of the boys' school, Harrogate College, in Ripon Road. From the first it had its dedicated section in the School Magazine detailing the various cultural, sporting and recreational activities enjoyed by the girls. Then from 1905, by when the present school had opened, it had its own Magazine. This article looks at how it detailed some of those many activities in the late Victorian and Edwardian years.





A varied cultural life was important from the beginning. Older girls attended public lectures in the town, including those put on as part of the university extension movement, which sought to make the work of scholars more widely available. In 1906, for example, they were able to hear A. J. Grant of Leeds University, an authority on the French Revolution. The school had a Literary Society, which listened to extracts from the classics, like Chaucer and Shakespeare but also George Eliot's The Mill on the Floss. There was a Historical Society and a Dramatic Society. Girls were encouraged to learn musical instruments.

One of the best documented activities was the Debating Society. It started off with Hockey versus Cricket but included more serious issues like votes for women in 1909, a debate interrupted by two militant suffragettes, bearing a large 'Votes for Women' banner. The report gave them short shrift, however, saying 'their exhibition caused more amusement than consternation, and no one considering them worthy of being thrown out of the room, they retired with as much dignity as they could muster.' The vote was 19 to 14 in favour of women having the vote, a dramatic contrast to just two years earlier when a similar motion was heavily defeated. Several College girls were later involved in the movement.

Ella and Edie Westwood, were reported in 1913 as going off to a Suffragist Summer School, having taken part in the July procession, although it was noted that they were non-militant. A large majority defeated the motion that 'Girls have a better time than boys'. A. Bowden opposed, arguing that boys had a large range of future occupations from which to choose, received better education, wore more convenient clothing, and while they could play all the girls' games, the reverse was not the case. And they were physically 'so much stronger'.

Perhaps one of the most ambitious cultural initiatives was the Branch School at St Germain-en-Laye, just outside Paris called La Maison Blanche, opened in 1907. Here older girls would speak only French, meet French girls, attend lectures at the Sorbonne and visit the city's art galleries and places of interest. Sadly, it had to close when the War came but a special French house was opened at the school to continue at least the French speaking, usually with teachers themselves French. In the dining hall also, French was spoken at two tables and German at a third. German teachers at the school were another loss occasioned by the War.

Sport for girls was at first not something that was felt to be properly ladylike, but this view was changing by the late-Victorian years, partly from the growing general feeling among women educationalists that girls should do just what the boys did.

Girls outside La Maison Blanche

favoured at playtime but the author of the Magazine piece looked forward to cricket. lacrosse and football still a step too far at this time. Gym was permitted, in 'rational clothing'. But in 1898, two cricket elevens were formed, and the girls were looking forward to a match with the boys, 'it is rather wounding to our pride to feel we have no chance of winning, handicapped, playing left hand and with broomsticks'. Eventually girls were taking part in a whole range of sports and also including hockey, athletics, swimming, tennis and schools in Harrogate, like Dunorlan on Park Road, or from further afield like Bradford Girls' Grammar School. Although sport seems therefore to have been popular with the girls, it never became the obsession that it did in boys' schools, to the detriment

Skipping was said at first to be

There was time allowed for private play and reading, but also lots of more organised recreation. There were many day trips to local places like the Dropping Well at Knaresborough or Almscliffe Crag. To Fountains Abbey eight girls cycled while the remainder went in a coach, horse-drawn still then. Or more ambitiously, a weekend at Scarborough in the summer of 1897 to mark Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. The girls were not, however, allowed to forget those less fortunate than themselves and charitable work in their spare time was stressed. An loyal British subjects must feel bound to contribute to the best of their ability'. The school later supported a Sri Lanka). The poor and sick nearer home were also not forgotten. In 1897, the school's Helpful Work Association made dolls and scrapbooks which then distributed to poor sick children. The Magazine commented that Ethel Mills' Snow Queen, which won first prize, 'seemed more fit to be placed under a glass case than in the hot little hands of children in a hospital ward'. In 1911, several girls visited the recently opened Home for Crippled Children in Tewit Well Road and the children in turn came to a Christmas party at the College. Money raised was to help send Dr Barnardo's children to a new life in Canada.

Of course, we only know how these things were reported in the Magazine. Were there girls who did not like sport or relish a performance of Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme in the original French? Did all embrace the charitable work with enthusiasm? What we can say is that there was an immense and varied amount of activities on offer for the school's pupils to enjoy.

A LEVEL RESULTS
