I am delighted to introduce this year's Chronicle, which is a celebration of another successful and memorable year in the life of our school and its alumni community. From the activities of the youngest children, all the way through to the incredible careers and journeys of our alumni, our values and ethos pervade the whole school and are taken by our pupils out into the world as they leave us.

THE BEGINNING OF A NEW ERA

Our very special school community is now more than 130 years old. Having started life as a boys' school, we went on to become pioneers of girls' education. Like any forward-thinking organisation, we have continued to evolve in order to meet the needs of our pupils and parents, opening a co-ed nursery in 1997, followed by a co-ed prep school 25 years ago.

Our ethos has also evolved and today we are focused on providing an individual experience for pupils of all ages. With our ethos and the current challenging climate for all independent schools in mind, the Senior Leadership Team and Governors have decided to begin the phased transition to a co-ed senior school provision from September 2026.

Our plan is to offer a co-ed provision in Year 7 and Year 12 from September 2026. This will then gradually move through the school with this intake of pupils.

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE

This next stage in the evolution of our school will also enable us to provide new and exciting opportunities to current pupils, such as a Design Technology department, cricket, boarding house refurbishment and a new stand-alone Sixth Form Centre

A NEW NAME FOR A NEW ERA

Harrogate Ladies' College would be a challenging name for a co-ed school. As you know, we were previously called Harrogate College, but this is now the name of a local Further Education college. We have therefore decided to change our name to Duchy College from September 2026. This is in recognition of our location on Duchy Road, within the Duchy area of Harrogate, and also

of the heritage of our beautiful school buildings, which are leased to us by the King's Duchy of Lancaster.

YOUR SCHOOL, YOUR ALUMNI

Our new name will be used across the whole school from 2-18 years, helping to bring us together as one community. The names Harrogate Ladies' College and Highfield Prep School will always be part of our heritage, part of our tradition, and part of what leads us into our future.

Above all, this will always be your school; you will always be part of our school community. We will continue to welcome you to school with open arms and we know you will continue to inspire our current and future pupils.

We will also continue to support you through the Alumni Association which, in time, will also welcome alumni of Duchy College alongside those of Harrogate College, Oakdale Prep School, Harrogate Ladies' College and Highfield Prep School.

It has been a year of change at the school from the welcoming of a new Principal. Joanna Fox. to the announcement that. from September 2026, there will be a phased admission of boys into the school.

Harrogate Ladies' College is not only an educational establishment, but it is a business and in these economic times, it must change and adapt to ensure the future of the school. I hope the alumni will join me in wishing HLC success as a co-ed school under its new name 'Duchy College'.

During the July 2025 HCU Executive Committee meeting, much discussion was focused on how we should use the remaining HCU funds to maximise their potential to support the alumni. As the school has taken over the administration of not only the alumni events but, more importantly, also the alumni database at some expense to the school, it was agreed half of the £21.288 should be given to the school to put towards the ongoing costs of the alumni programme.

In order to adhere to the spirit in which the HCU monies were acquired, it was agreed at the Executive meeting funds should not be used to support individual pupils except in exceptional circumstances.

Please direct any suggestions to either me or Sarah by emailing HCU@hlc.org.uk. The deadline for comments has been set as the end of January 2026, so the Committee can then agree on an outcome, and we thank you for your input.

I wish you all a very happy 2026 and look forward to seeing some of you at the Reunion on 25th April 2026.

BRIGITTE KAVIANI (NÉE NASSER)

YORK - 1979-1983 PREFECT

Brigitte is currently serving as the Programme Director of People Experience at the South Yorkshire Integrated Care Board, where she leads a dynamic team dedicated to enhancing the experience of over 72,000 health and care professionals across the region.

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I fondly remember my school years as a time of deep connection and personal growth. Living in Bethlehem, Palestine I travelled back and forth at the end of each term, supported by a close-knit circle of friends and their families. I embraced the wide range of sports and extracurricular activities, which helped shape my confidence, resilience, and team spirit.

After completing my A levels, I moved to Sheffield to study Diagnostic Radiography, launching my career at the Northern General Hospital. My early clinical years were marked by rapid progression, including leading the setup of Sheffield's first CT scanner.

Balancing the demands of motherhood and a full-time career, I transitioned into a nationally unique educational role within the Radiology department, earning a Postgraduate Diploma in Education and Learning from the University of Huddersfield.

In 2017, following the merger of Sheffield's hospitals, I was appointed Assistant Operations Director, leading on workforce for the largest care group in the trust. My leadership was especially critical during the COVID-19 pandemic, where I led the health and wellbeing response for the workforce.

In March 2021, I joined the South Yorkshire Integrated Care System as Head of Health and Wellbeing, a role that paved the way for my current position as Programme Director of People Experience in 2024. Today, I lead strategic programmes across mental health, wellbeing, retention, EDI & belonging, and talent.

My work includes the award-winning 'Mission: Menopause' initiative and I have been recognised with multiple accolades, including Employee Benefits Professional of the Year (2024) and team awards from HSJ, Henpicked, Employee Benefits, and HPMA.

I volunteer overseas, leading educational radiography programmes in developing countries such as Zambia — a global commitment to healthcare education and equity. My passion for sustainable impact led to the founding of Global First Aid Zambia, a non-profit organisation dedicated to improving first aid knowledge and emergency response capabilities. I have recently taken up partial retirement and seeking roles in supporting organisations in developing countries to support Global Majorities.

POLLY LANE

YORK - 1987-1994 HOUSE PREFECT AND ATHLETICS CAPTAIN

Polly is an Associate lawyer in the Human Rights and Specialist Litigation team at DAC Beachcroft in London. She defends complex Human Rights, discrimination and civil liberties cases for a range of public and private sector organisations.

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My memories of HLC are a mixed bag. On the positive side I remember laughing 'til I cried with funny friends, hot breakfasts and chocolate slop. The choir was my happy place – both as audience and participant. There's also a special place in my heart for the stationery order form and the sports room cupboard that smelt of lacrosse stick oil and Dunlop tennis shoes.

After leaving school, I headed for Oxford... alright, not *that* Oxford. Having slept through my A levels, I washed up at a secretarial college to be armed with enough skills to survive in London. My first love was music, and I found my way into the music industry doing TV and radio PR and organising live tours. It was exhilarating, if a little surreal – imagine a socially awkward teenager making polite chitchat with Bono.

Six hazy years of Soho gig venues later, a family tragedy shifted my priorities and, seeing as I had promised the rest of the Upper Sixth that I would be Prime Minister one day, I went to Goldsmiths to study Political Sociology with an eye on a career in political journalism, and

stood as Parliamentary candidate in the 2010 General Election. A master's degree followed, before a law conversion for entirely pragmatic purposes. I then trained at a human rights firm, cutting my teeth on criminal defence and civil liberties cases.

After having my first child, I joined the Government Legal Department, representing the Ministry of Defence in post-war human rights litigation and later serving as National Security Legal Advisor at the Home Office. Then after seven dynamic years in central government, I rejoined the private sector to take my career to the next level.

Today, I run complex cases involving discrimination and police misconduct, often touching on cutting-edge legal issues, and occasionally making the news. My advice to aspiring human rights lawyers? Perhaps don't sleep through your A Levels. Be patient. The rewards aren't always financial, but the experiences are far richer. As for me, Partnership could be next. That or Prime Minister."



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TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES

THE WAR YEARS AT SWINTON CASTLE

By 1938, plans were already being made in anticipation of war. Staff at the College began to attend instruction in air raid precautions. Nationwide preparations included the evacuation of city children and the move of key government departments away from the capital. For the latter, Harrogate, in the comparative safety of Yorkshire and with many suitable buildings, was an ideal location. So it was that the College was told that in the event of war it was to be requisitioned for the use of a section of the air ministry. The minister was Viscount Swinton, and he offered the College the use of his home near Masham in Wensleydale for their use.



Preparations for the move had already begun when the lease was signed in October 1939. The College paid a peppercorn rent but was required to cover the cost of any necessary alterations, ongoing maintenance, damage done during its stay and for electricity and water supplies from Swinton's own power plant and waterworks. The school was accommodated in the main section of the house, while Lady Swinton occupied rooms in the West Wing. Preparations included covering the floors with linoleum and providing extra support for the main staircase in anticipation of an 'onslaught of vicorous feet'

Around 300 girls then moved to Swinton in mid-October; the Junior School at Oakdale remained in Harrogate. When war broke out the headmistress, Miss Jacob, and a group of girls and staff were actually in Canada, the cricket team having gone there in August for an exhibition tour. After some delay they sailed back to England in convoy as a precaution against the threat of U-boat attack and docked on the 28th after in

As far as possible school life was continued as before. Lessons were taught and exams were sat; university and college places gained. On Sunday church service was held in Masham. School dinners were eaten in the magnificent dining room and, despite rationing, good, healthy meals were served, including local rabbits and occasionally venison. The stables were converted to accommodate baths and showers, each girl allotted two baths, no more than five inches deep, and a shower each week.

TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES



Sport was important. Miss Jacob had been a hockey blue at Cambridge and now had several front teeth knocked out in a match between staff and pupils. There were netball, rounders, tennis, gymnastics, lacrosse and cricket, matches being played between girls and estate workers and a team of Masham 'boys', although it was noted that some of them actually looked about 20. Cycling was popular and swimming in a nearby reservoir. Harsh winters meant that skating was possible on the Home Lake; tobogganing was apparently not permitted but girls enjoyed it anyway using sheets of aluminium purloined from roadside ammunition dumps.

A wide range of music, entertainment, and interest groups also flourished. Piano practice rooms were in the dog kennels but for lessons, bedrooms in the main house were used. There was panic on one occasion when the piano tuner arrived, and some girls had hidden contraband food behind a panel in one for a midnight

feast; fortunately for them the tuner did not get to that particular piano that day. There were concerts, a highlight being the Carol Service. There were guest speakers, like Monsieur Inébnit on Rousseau or a Mr Beard on 'The coal miner and his life'. Plays were produced and performed, like the History Plays by the Fourth Form or Molière's Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme. The School Cinema included screenings of films like The Lady Vanishes. There were history expeditions to places like Middleham and Fountains Abbey and the Literary and Debating Society flourished.

Nevertheless, the war was always present. An air raid shelter was constructed in the ha-ha between the park and the garden and girls had to huddle there when the siren sounded. Identity cards and ration books were issued, and gas masks were at first carried everywhere.

Girls and members of staff had fathers and brothers serving, some of whom were killed or taken prisoner. The girls undertook a variety of work in support of the war effort through the Victory Service Clubs, formed from 1941, including making camouflage netting, gardening (lifting potatoes), knitting for the troops and collecting salvage. Due to the callup of domestic staff, girls performed tasks like laying and clearing the tables at mealtimes, mending their clothes, making jams and hoovering. Many old girls were actively involved. Of the 90 members of the Harrogate alumni branch, for example, in 1941 Brenda Wales was a telephonist in the W.R.N.S. in Northern Ireland, while Peggy Ferguson drove a mobile canteen round isolated camps and searchlight stations around Scarborough. Some had hair-raising experiences. Jenny Salmond, of the Edinburgh and North of Scotland Branch, and her sons were sailing to India to be with her husband when their ship was torpedoed and sunk; they were rescued but lost all their belongings.

From 1943, it was clear that the war was going to be won. Thoughts turned increasingly to the future. A Post-War Reconstruction Group was set up in the sixth form and met fortnightly to discuss issues such as the future position of women or the introduction of a state medical service. A mock election produced a victory for the Conservatives.

The war's end did not bring an immediate return to Harrogate, which was delayed until 1946 for the start of a new school year due to the need to prepare the premises, which very much bore the marks of wartime use. Conversely, the College had to foot the bill for repairs arising from their occupation of Swinton, in total over £4,000 (well over £200,000 today). The first Speech Day since hostilities began was held at the College on 26 July 1947. None of the returning girls had ever known the Harrogate school. Lord Swinton attended to present the prizes and trophies. In his speech he paid tribute to the morale

and discipline of the girls, saying 'You maintained an extraordinarily high standard of behaviour in our home', and adding 'You never threw darts at my ancestors!' For her part, Miss Jacob noted the seven years that the school had spent at Swinton, finding there 'a sanctuary amid the danger and anxiety of war and a home of great beauty and happiness.' The College was granted the Freedom of Swinton and thereafter enjoyed school holidays there.

PUPILS CELEBRATE BEST A LEVEL RESULTS FOR **OVER FIVE YEARS**

85% OF ALL RESULTS WERE A*-C GRADES


This is the highest percentage since prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, the number of A* grades doubled compared to the previous year and nearly half of all pupils achieved at least one A* or A grade.

These outstanding grades were achieved across a wide range of subjects, with 80% A*-B grades in Modern Languages, Business and Economics and 100% of Textiles pupils achieving A*-B grades.

Our pupils will now go on to study a broad range of subjects in the next stage of their academic iourney, with careers in Medicine, Archaeology. Law, Business, Psychology and International Relations all on the horizon.

A RECORD 22% OF ALL GRADES AT THE SCHOOL WERE 9S, WHILE OVER A THIRD OF PUPILS ACHIEVED 5 OR MORE 9-7 GRADES.

Pupils studying STEM subjects continue to excel with 80% of all Physics grades at 9-7, while in Creative Arts (Art and Textiles), 81% of all grades were 9-7 and an incredible 22% of pupils achieved marks of 100%.



The pupils achieved an average of one grade higher than their baseline prediction, a key indicator of both their hard work and the quality of teaching at the school.

These pupils will be part of history, becoming the first to achieve their A levels from Duchy College in two years' time, as we prepare for our new co-ed era. Through our individualised support, we look forward to nurturing each and every one of them in the next stage of their academic journey.

Now in Lower 6. India Thomas achieved a clean sweep of 10 x 9s in her GCSEs, including a perfect score of 100% in Textiles.

Another pupil who shone in STEM subjects was Reewa Bennett, with 4 of her 9 x 9s coming in Maths. Biology. Chemistry and Physics.

SPORTING EXCELLENCE

At the Area Netball Tournaments, each of our teams rose to the challenge that faced them.

The U12s battled hard, securing two impressive wins and narrowly missing out on the knockout stages. The U19s had a particularly strong showing, finishing third overall - our best result in years - while the U15s enjoyed a fantastic campaign, reaching the final and earning an excellent second-place finish.

Our netball trip to Valkenburg combined competitive training with cultural exploration. The pupils took part in high-level coaching, competed in a tournament and ended their visit with a thrilling day at a theme park, strengthening team spirit and creating lasting memories.

Our football teams have also enjoyed a season full of highlights. The U13s earned a commanding 6-0 win against St John Fisher and staged a gutsy comeback to beat Ripon Grammar 2-1, before delivering a confident 3-0 victory over Woodhouse Grove.

Our badminton teams proved to be a real force, with the U15s defeating Queen Margaret's 6-2 after several tense rallies, and the seniors securing a 10-6 win through tactical play.

In athletics, 13 pupils were placed in the top 3 in the first round of the Harrogate and Craver Athletics Competition, with 7 event wins and 20 finalists. At the Harrogate and Craven Finals, nine pupils reached the podium, the junior girls' 300m school record was broken and two of our athletes were crowned Harrogate and District champions in the discus for their age groups.

In the Yorkshire lacrosse trials seven pupils from lower school, twelve from middle schoo and five seniors were all successful and went on to represent Yorkshire.

The sun shone on Sports Day, and we saw some amazing competition throughout the afternoon! There was fantastic sportsmanship and determination on show.



MUSICAL HIGHLIGHTS

In the Spring term, the annual House Music competition produced some fabulous performances.

In addition to the house music performances, the Upper 6 cohort staged a memorable tribute honouring their time at College together. While Franklin took home the overall winners' prize, Director of Music, Mrs Kate Morgan, was impressed by the standard of each House's performance. SCIENCE:

EXPLORING, EXPERIMENTING, EXCELLING

At College, our science and engineering initiative was relaunched this year to incorporate a tiered system for individuals to demonstrate their passion and involvement in STEM-related areas. This drew together all STEM subject leads including PE, Maths, Psychology, Food and Nutrition and any activity that crossed over to STEM via the Arts. Pupils across all age groups have enjoyed Astronomy Club, Gardening Club, Baking Club, Coding Club, Maths clinics, as well as volunteering in the wider Harrogate Community, participating in the Science Fair and the CREST club.

The school entered the Teen Tech Awards, a nationally recognised competition where pupils design innovative solutions to everyday problems. We ran this competition as part of our 'future scientists' club. We achieved one Bronze award, two Silver awards and two Gold awards, with one team making it to the grand finals in London. They were placed in the top 5 groups for Best Research. The quality of the projects along with how the programme was organised was highly commended and, consequently, our

school has been officially accredited as a Silver Centre of Innovation and Creativity.

Science pupils had an unforgettable opportunity on the Physics trip to CERN in Switzerland, where they visited the world-renowned particle accelerator and heard from leading experts in particle physics. The experience brought complex theories to life and inspired many to consider careers in STEM.
